60th anniversary celebrations and documentary premiere highlight story of Shangri-La's founding families

In honor of the organization's 60th anniversary, Shangri-La produced a minidocumentary that told the story of Shangri-La's founding families and their journey to start the organization in the early 1960s.

The documentary debuted at an in-person 60th-anniversary gathering on May 2, 2023, on the present-day site of the original Shangri-La School campus and was shown again during a series of virtual celebrations held the following week.

Three founding families were highlighted in the video -- Ron and Florence Hall (as told by their daughter Judy Kennedy), Howard and Luella Nice (as told by their son Dennis Nice), and Dorothy Monnier.

"As we get farther and farther into our organization's tenure, the less opportunity we have to record its founding history from those closest to it," said Nick McCrea, Shangri-La's digital media specialist, about why he wanted to make the video. "In the coming months, I hope we can capture additional interviews with early families and individuals served on the original campus still in our services today."

Permanent generators ready to power homes during electrical outages

Since 2022, Shangri-La has been working to install automatic standby generators, powered by natural gas, at eight residential programs serving individuals with disabilities.

Installing permanent generators became a priority after natural disasters in 2021 and 2022 highlighted gaps in Shangri-La's emergency response plans.

"During the ice storm in 2021 and the windstorm in 2022, we had four homes go without power for almost two weeks," said Robin Winkle, director of operations. "We had to scramble to locate small gas generators in order to keep people safe."

Outside of the common challenges associated with a power outage -- like heat and cooking --, some

Shangri-La residential programs face even more significant challenges when without electricity for extended periods -- for example, running and recharging medical and mobility equipment like oxygen machines and lifts.

"During the ice storm in 2021 and the wind storm in 2022, we had four homes go without power for almost two weeks. We had to scramble to locate gas generators in order to keep people safe." - Robin Winkle, Director of Operations. In the past, Shangri-La tried storing small, basic gas generators for use in case of an emergency but found that when they were needed, use didn't go smoothly for a variety of reasons, including gasoline availability, difficulty delivering generators to programs due to dangerous road conditions, and staff being unsure how to operate the machines safely.

Therefore, Shangri-La applied for a grant and received money from **Marie Lamfrom Community Foundation** to purchase generators. "I contacted Alternative Power Source out of Estacada," Winkle said, "One of the few generator vendors in Oregon, and they were able to order the systems, which took over ten months to become available."

Given the cost of the generators and the need for a natural gas meter to power the generator, Shangri-La selected specific programs, based on needs of the program, and geographic relation to other programs to receive a generator.

"We made the systems large enough to run the full home so that others [from other affected homes] could relocate to a generator-powered home when needed," explained Winkle.

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12,000 yellow napkins aim to spark conversation about disability among community members

During Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month in March, distribution partners, mainly food service establishments, throughout Marion County distributed yellow napkins featuring five disability awareness and etiquette messages.

Shangri-La, in partnership with **Umpqua Bank** (formerly **Columbia Bank**) started the Yellow Napkin Project in 2022. The original pilot project included 2,500 napkins distributed mainly in Salem. Shangri-La and its 20+ distribution partners, including many businesses in rural Marion County, distributed 12,000 napkins this year featuring messages in English and Spanish.

Advocacy for increased DSP wages is priority of current legislative session

During the current legislative session, Shangri-La, the Oregon Resource Association, and many other providers across the state have advocated for state funding to increase wages for direct support professionals (DSP), specifically the Policy Option Package (POP) 132.

Increasing DSP wages is a critical step in addressing a significant workforce shortage. Many providers report a DSP vacancy rate of 23% or higher.

"The pandemic and changing workforce have continued to diminish our progress on wages," explained Amanda Valerio, a residential manager at Shangri-La. " On July 1, the minimum wage [in Oregon] is set to take another giant step up – and our wages must match this [increase] because DSP jobs are not minimum wage jobs!"

POP 132 includes wage inflation and rate increases that would improve DSP wages from around \$17 per hour to an average of \$20 per hour for the next biennium.
