### Fun and then some: Egg hunt models how minor adjustments can make a common community event more accessible

Shangri-La's fifth annual Accessible Egg Hunt was held on April 20 at the Log house Garden in Keizer -- home of the accessible egg hunt for the fourth year in a row.

With a mixture of grassy and paved surfaces and a go-at-your-own pace environment, attendees of all ages with varying mobility abilities were able to safely partake in a community egg hunt.

In addition to activities such as face painting,

bunny ear ring toss, a duck matching game, and a token redemption booth where attendees could win hundreds of prizes donated by event partners, this year there were a few new attractions, including karaoke from Carried Away Entertainment, a professional photo booth courtesy of Only the Best Sound and Photobooth where event attendees could get their photo taken with the Easter bunny, and -- what may have been the biggest hit of all -- interactions and hugs

from Caesar the No Drama Llama.

"This event is so important to Shangri-La because we want to be a role model in showing our community what inclusive and accessible events look like,"

> explained Ashley Erb, Shangri-La's director of community engagement. "Often, minor modifications to events -- like hiding eggs up off the ground so people with walkers or wheelchairs can more easily get to the eggs -- can make a big difference."

A special thank you to our presenting partner Salem Electric whose employees also volunteered their time alongside individuals from Shangri-La's Life Enrichment Activities Program to fill nearly 6,000 eggs, twice as many eggs as previous

## Interactive luncheon gives attendees tangible tips on how to create more inclusive communities

Shangri-La's annual Better Together Luncheon aims to raise awareness and funds for Shangri-La's work and inspire movement towards more inclusive communities.

Through mini experiential activities, guests learned three tangible ways they could start creating more inclusive communities right away.

The commonality of invisible disabilities was discussed and guests were encouraged to make asking if accommodation is needed a part of their regular interactions with all people, not just when by physical appearance it is assumed a disability might exist.

Each guests also received a fidget toy (pictured top right) and were asked to make these toys available at their workplaces for individuals who are on the Autism spectrum, have ADHD or those experiencing anxiety disorders

And lastly, through a role play scenario (pictured top left), guests learned how simple accommodations like pen and paper or communication phrase cards

(pictured top middle) can help individuals with disabilities be more independent in accomplishing tasks -- like serving lunch in a group of people.

Attendees were encouraged to share these simple tips and what they learned through these activities with others after the event.

"[At the dinner table that night], I talked with my kids about the luncheon and what we did. It was a really good discussion for my older kinds to have," said one luncheon attendee.

Thanks to the luncheon's event partners Managed Health Care Pharmacy, PayneWest Insurance, Saalfeld Griggs, The Summit Group of Oregon, Credible Software, and a \$2,500 match from Modern Woodmen of American, all of the events proceeds went directly to support Shangri-La's work.

In all, the event returned approximately \$15,000 to the organization and raised support for the organization in many other ways including volunteers, donation drive hosts, job placement leads, and new newsletter recipients.

## Working with diverse populations was highlight of practicum experience

Steve Grillo -- a recent Oregon-transplant from Hawaii after volcanic eruptions displaced him and his family -- will complete his 700-hour practicum with Shangri-La's Outpatient Mental Health Clinic in June.

Steve is earning his Masters of Science in Clinical Psychology. The practicum is a graduation requirement for his program at Capella University.

- Steve Girillo, practicum student Since he started at Shangri-La in January 2019, Steve has spent his time screening, assessing, and diagnosing clinic patients, and providing therapy at Shangri-La clinics in both Salem and Eugene.

Steve's work as practicum was supervised by one of Shangri-La's counselors who is a licensed clinical social worker (LCSW) and is authorized to provide practicum supervision.

"Of those 700 hours, 300 of those hours were spent face to face with clients," Steve explained. During his practicum, he was also able to attend trainings, learn new skills, and obtained his national certification as an alcohol and drug counselor.

"The major thing about this experience that I've appreciated is the diversity of the population I've been able to work with," Steve said. "Autistic, quadriplegic, I/DD, kids. I have never worked with any of these populations before. My background is adults with mental health and substance abuse. So gaining that experience was a real pleasure for me."

After his practicum, Steve will be starting as Shangri-La's newest clinic intake specialist.

# Annual breakfast honors partners; gives platform for sharing success story

Shangri-La held it's third annual "Lucky to Know You" breakfast on March 15. The breakfast is a combined effort by the Youth and Family Services (YFS) program and the Community Employment Services (CES) program to host and thank their community partners.

YFS focuses on work experience opportunities to help parents overcome barriers to obtaining or maintaining employment while CES focuses on helping individuals with disabilities obtain community employment.

"About 10 to 15 businesses have been represented over the years," said Katherine Skelton, a YFS manager.

While the main reason for the breakfast is to honor the businesses that train and employ participants in both the programs, it also serves as an opportunity for the businesses to network with each other, share their positive experiences with the program, and hear success stories participants in both programs.

"Willamette Heritage has come every year," explained Katherine. "They are great because they have an employee who represents both paths. So it's nice to have them there as an example [of how businesses can support participants in both programs]."
